What's new in 2017?

All competitors

New online entry system! If you are a member, please enter the discount code "MEMBER" at the checkout to receive your reduced fees. Your information, tickets and passes will be sent to you immediately upon payment, along with a summary for each entry. You do not need to print out the entry summaries, but please have all admission tickets and car passes with you when you arrive.

At the moment, our new entry system does not accommodate entering one animal into multiple classes using the same animal information. Please complete the first entry for one class in full, and any subsequent classes for the same animal please enter the animals name into the animal name field.

Cattle

TB Pre-Movement Testing will be necessary for cattle coming to the Show.

Please collect your exhibitor pack from the livestock office behind the cattle tent.

"Rare and traditional beef breeds" section is now "Any other native beef breed", open to all native beef breeds not eligible to enter a previous section.

"Any other dairy breed" classes now mirror "Ayrshire" cattle classes

Beef group championship is now for two animals, not three.

A 'Judges' pick group of 3' championship and a 'Public's choice' competition has been introduced.

Dairy goats

Milking competition classes have been reduced to two classes.

Travel vouchers are available from your steward on request for cattle and sheep exhibitors, if you have travelled further than 20 miles to the showground from your previous holding location with two animals or more. Travel vouchers can be cashed at the bank or sent to the show office in Bramley.

Small bales of straw are available to purchase for sheep and cattle if required at £4 per bale and will be in your allocated area/pens on arrival. Please order when making your entries.

General rules and regulations – all competitors

Surrey County Show holding number: 40/076/8002

1. To be eligible to make entries at members' rates an exhibitor must have paid the annual subscription for the current year, 2017, prior to making their entries.
2. Where points count towards the award of a cup a first shall count 3, a second count 2 and a third count 1.
3. An exhibitor withdrawing any exhibit after entry will not be entitled to have entry fees returned. No refunds of entry or penning fees will be made if the show must be cancelled for any reason beyond the control of the Society.
4. The Society reserves the right to cancel any breed section with three or less exhibitors, and to amalgamate or cancel classes in which there are less than six entries. In the event of a class having to be cancelled, the entry fees will be returned.
5. Any competitor intending to object to any exhibit must notify the secretary in writing within one hour of the class having been judged with a deposit of £25.00, which will be returned if the protest is sustained, but if in the opinion of the Committee the objection is unreasonable, the deposit to be forfeited. The decision of the Committee shall be final and binding to all parties.
6. Ages will be taken as on the date of the show for animals and handlers unless otherwise stated.
7. The prescribed fee for each entry must be paid to the Society before the closing date for classes.
8. A judge's decision shall be final.
9. Neither the Society nor any of its officers or servants will be responsible for anything that may happen to exhibitors, their servants or any other person, or their respective property or animals, or to any exhibit at the show, and it shall be considered a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall hold the Society blameless and that he shall be considered to indemnify the Society against any legal proceedings, claims or demands in respect thereof. Exhibitors acknowledge that they are taking part in a risk sport and agree to having achieved a level of competency. In addition, they agree that they understand it is their responsibility to insure their property, animals and livestock whilst on the Showground and hold full public liability insurance.
10. All exhibitors should be a member of their respective Breed Societies'. Classes will be judged according to their respective Society, Association or discipline rules. The Society will not tolerate the administration to show exhibits of tranquillizers or other drugs which may in any way affect the performance of the animal in question to have the effect of making it behave in the show

ring in a manner which is not natural. The Society reserves the right to take any necessary samples. Any Person or Exhibitor (or their representative) who is found to have administered or permitted the administration of any such tranquillizer or drugs to any Show exhibit will be reported to the Council and referred to the appropriate Breed Society.

Extract of rules

11. Any dispute or doubt arising on any questions connected with the Society shall be referred to the Show Secretary in the first instance, who may refer the matter to the Society's Chairman of Council or Chairman of the Livestock Committee as appropriate.

Interpretation of rules and regulations

12. The Council shall have power to interpret these rules and the regulations above mentioned if there should be any ambiguity or difference of opinion concerning the purport or intention of any rule or regulation. The Council shall have power to deal with any matter not provided for in these rules. A full copy of the articles of association of the society may be obtained from the secretary on request.
13. The Society has taken reasonable precautions to ensure the health and safety of everyone present at the show. Animals, however, can sometimes be unpredictable. For these measures to be effective, everyone must take all reasonable precautions to avoid or prevent accidents occurring and must act upon the instructions of officials and stewards.

Animal welfare rules

14. Pregnant animals, where 90% or more of the gestation period has elapsed, may not be transported. In the case of cattle, if a live calf is born on the showground (whether prematurely or full term), animal welfare regulations do not allow its transportation for seven days after birth; exhibitors will have to bear any additional costs or damages which the Society may incur as a result.

Livestock rules and regulations

Stewards reserve the right to reject any animal deemed to be unsafe.

Owners of cattle, sheep and goats need to comply with current legislative requirements and conditions from Defra concerning identity, passports and travel

movements. For up to date information, please contact your local Animal Health Office or check the Defra website www.gov.uk/defra. In the event that you are excluded from showing with us due to any last minute Defra disease legislation, Livestock exhibitors will be offered a full refund of entry fees up to three weeks before the show.

Important notes for exhibitors.

Livestock should be on the show ground not later than 7.30am and must remain until 4.30pm on show day. All sheep and cattle prize winners are expected to take part in the cattle parade.

Competitor information: All competitor information and tickets are sent by email when an email address is provided. Competitors can collect their packs from the commentary box (cattle, sheep and pigs) or your steward (goats).

Prize money: All prize winners will be awarded a prize money voucher by the Steward. This can be either cashed on the day at the bank (adjacent to the Show Office) or sent to the show office in Bramley. You will be sent a cheque. Alternatively, please write your account details on the back of the voucher and a transfer will be made. The vouchers must be redeemed by 31st July 2017.

Entry and stalling: Exhibitors should reserve stalls/pens for the number of animals they intend to bring to the show.

Accommodation: All animals are housed in covered accommodation.

Facilities: Basic showers will be available in the Stoke Park Farm changing rooms. The Stockman's restaurant will be available from Sunday lunch time.

The milking parlour: The Milk and Dairies (General) Regulations, must be observed at all times, especially: a) No smoking during milking, b) Overalls must be worn and c) Cleansing equipment after use. The Society will pay for milk produced in the milking parlour at the price ruling at the time. The parlour is open 24 hours, but exhibitors using it when the steward is absent must clean the equipment afterwards.

Forage: Exhibitors are asked to make their own arrangements for feeding stuffs.

Cattle

Westpoint Veterinary Services (www.westpointfarmvets.co.uk), through their lab Biobest, will cover the first year of the annual membership costs of any herd who was not currently entered into a cattle health scheme and wanting to enter into a

health scheme.

In addition, they have very kindly offered subsidized PRMT for exhibitors attending the Surrey County Show. If you would like more information, please call Westpoint Veterinary Services on 01306 628086.

1. TB Pre-Movement Testing will be necessary for cattle coming to the Show. Please check the latest information on the DEFRA web site. A copy of any clear pre-movement TB test certificate should accompany each animal to the show and will be checked by a steward.
2. All movements of cattle to and from the show must be recorded separately by the exhibitor in the cattle passport and be reported to the BCMS within 3 days. The Show will also record movements on and off the showground. All cattle should be accompanied by their passports or a certificate of registration. An officer of the Society will check all cattle documentation at the Show.
3. Cattle must originate from premises which are not under DEFRA restrictions for tuberculosis or brucellosis. They must have been the bona fide property of the exhibitor on his holding at least two calendar months prior to the show.
4. Animals which calve, or show evidence of calving, whilst at the showground must be placed in the approved isolation accommodation pending their removal from the showground.
5. Where an animal calves at full term and the owner arranges for a blood sample and a vaginal swab to be taken and examined at an approved laboratory, and the Rose Bengal Plate Test and microscopical examination of a smear made from the vaginal swab are negative, the animal may return to the show lines at the discretion of the Show Secretary.
6. Where an animal calves prematurely, or aborts, the onsite veterinary surgeon must be informed immediately. The appropriate precautions and procedures will be followed before the animal(s) can leave the showground.
7. Bulls over 10 months of age should be rung. All bull handlers must be aged 18 years and over.
8. All young handlers under the age of 14 years must be closely supervised at all times.
9. Cattle must be tied up, and exhibitors shall provide their own ties.
10. Any artificial contrivance or device found on or proved to have been used on an animal at any time whilst that animal is in the Showground, either for preventing the flow of milk or for any other improper purpose will disqualify that animal from the competition and the instigator or the owner of the said animal may be prohibited from entering Stock in any future competition as the Society may see fit. The Society reserves the right to have all animals

- inspected by the Hon. Veterinary Officers, either prior to, during, or after judging.
11. When cows or heifers are shown as 'in-calf' the prize money will be withheld until a certificate of calving is produced to the Society.
 12. Only the champion of each breed will be eligible to compete for the supreme championship. The reserve of the breed of the chosen champion will be eligible to compete for the reserve supreme championship. In the case of a Group class, the reserve will not be eligible to compete.
 13. Cattle may automatically transfer from In-Calf to In-Milk classes and vice versa.
 14. No Warbled cattle will be allowed into the show without a completed declaration of treatment (form C) and this form can be obtained from the Local Authority or Defra.
 15. Cattle belonging to herds with CheCS-accredited status must be accompanied by a Herd Certificate of Status. Members must ensure that they and their cattle comply with the Scheme rules concerning attendance at shows.
 16. Substitutions. In any class, exhibitors must provide full details of animals to be exhibited by the closing date of entries into the Show Catalogue and the Society reserves the right to refuse acceptance of any entry where the details given are incomplete. Substitution of animals in the cattle section will be allowed after the closing date at the discretion of the Show Office. The only exception to this is in the case of dairy classes, where changes may be made if last minute calving has/has not occurred. In this case, the Breed Steward must be informed prior to judging commences.
 17. Transportation – if you are not able to complete your transportation details on the entry form, please furnish these details to your Steward on arrival for our records.

Sheep

Sheep must be on the showground by 7.30am on show day and remain until 4.30pm.

1. All exhibitors have the option of reporting the on movement of sheep via the electronic ARAMS system. All movement forms must be sent within 3 days of the show, and sent to: ARAMS, SouthWestern, PO BOX 6299, Milton Keynes, MK10 1ZQ. Your steward will collect your AML 1 forms on arrival, or a copy of your online movement form. Sheep must be in the possession of the exhibitors two months prior to the date of the show. Check the ARAMS or Defra website for the latest information.
2. The use of artificial colouring, whitening and/or powder on sheep, as

well as the removal or addition of spots by artificial means, is prohibited.

3. Maedi-Visna accredited accommodation will only be provided for sheep which have been signified as being of such status on the entry form and must be accompanied by a valid, fully completed SAC Form. Certificates to be collected prior to unloading. Members must ensure that they and their sheep comply with the Schemes' Rules concerning attendance at Shows.
4. Docking. Sufficient tail must have been retained to cover the vulva of a female sheep and the anus of a male sheep, bred in the United Kingdom. See The Welfare of Livestock (Prohibited Operations) Regulation 1982.

Dairy goats

1. All exhibitors have the option of reporting the on movement of sheep via the electronic ARAMS system. All movement forms must be sent within 3 days of the show, and sent to: ARAMS, SouthWestern, PO BOX 6299, Milton Keynes, MK10 1ZQ. Your steward will collect your AML 1 forms on arrival, or a copy of your online movement form. Sheep must be in the possession of the exhibitors two months prior to the date of the show. Check the ARAMS or Defra website for the latest information.
2. All stock exhibited must be CAE negative and a current test certificate must accompany all animals attending the Show. Facilities for goats in the SAC Sheep and Goat Health Scheme will be provided. In order to prevent the possible spread of CAE at shows, exhibitors may not use pooled milk to feed kids.
3. Goats must arrive on the showground by 5pm on Sunday except those bringing stripping certificates who must be on the ground by 9pm. All must remain until 5pm on Show Day. Goatlings must arrive by 9am on Show day and also remain until 5pm.
4. The Goat classes are held under the rules, regulations and recognition of the British Goat Society. All exhibits must be registered with the British Goat Society as in the ownership in the name of the exhibitor, the registered name and number being quoted on the entry form. Kidding dates for goats in milk must be stated on the entry form. All goats in milk must have kidded or aborted a minimum of 30 days prior to the day of the show and must be non-pregnant.
5. The judge may withhold any award and his or her decision is final.
6. Exhibitors are asked to make their own arrangements for feeding stuffs.

Pygmy goats

1. All goats must be penned by 9am on Show day and must remain until 5pm.
2. Conditions of entry are subject to current DEFRA movement restrictions and

exhibitors must comply with all animal health regulations in force at the time of the show. All stock CAE negative must have a current test certificate, a copy of which is to be sent in with the entry form. Non-tested stock will be penned separately. Facilities for goats in the SAC Sheep and Goat Health Scheme will be provided.

2. All goats must be ear tagged in accordance with DEFRA regulations.
3. All exhibits must be registered with the Pygmy Goat club with the exception of female kids under 6 months, male kids under 12 months, wethers and pet females. Registration details must be included on the entry form. Kids to be at least 8 weeks old on the day of the show.
4. All exhibitors (except Junior handlers) must be current members of the Pygmy Goat Club.
5. All dates to be calculated to the day of the show. Dates of birth and kidding dates to be included on the entry form.
6. No pregnant goats may be admitted to the show ground. Goats to have kidded a minimum of 30 days prior to the show.
7. Classes with only one entry will be cancelled or if possible amalgamated.
8. No entries to be accepted for goats bred or previously owned by the judge.
9. Please do not bring goats that have not been entered into a class.
10. No late entries or substitutions taken unless accompanied by a vet certificate.
11. 6' x 3' pens will be provided. Please specify on your entry form how many pens you require (based upon 2 females sharing a pen and 1 male per pen).
12. Exhibitors are asked to make their own arrangements for feeding stuffs.

Pigs

Pigs must be on the showground by 7.30am and remain until 4.30pm on Show day.

1. Pigs must be a minimum of three months old on Show day.
2. Please state number of pens required on the entry form.
3. Classes will be cancelled or amalgamated if there are insufficient entries.
4. All exhibits should be ear tagged, showing their Defra UK herd number and individual ID number.
5. Exhibitors are asked to make their own arrangements for feeding stuffs.
6. Tickets, vehicle passes and exhibitor information will be sent out electronically prior to the show. Please collect your pack containing your numbers from the Livestock Commentary Box on arrival.
7. Classes commence at 10.00am. There is no entry to the showground after 7.30am. Pigs must remain penned until 4.30pm.
8. Entries for novelty classes will be taken on the day.

9. All movements of pigs must be recorded using eAML2 electronic movement system www.eaml2.org.uk, or alternatively on a movement/hauliers form from the eAML2 Bureau Service. The Society must hold accurate records of all pigs attending and movement dates.

Only exhibitors who have booked three or more animals are eligible to enter for this award. The following will be taken in consideration and are guidelines for the competition.

1. The purpose of this competition is to help improve the presentation of animals at the show and to give professional information to cattle breeders and farmers in general and information of interest to the public.
2. Signs displaying information about the herd, stock exhibited and for sale, pedigrees and production information may be fixed by the exhibitor to the framework at the rear of the stalls.
3. In addition to the herd display sign, the judge will also be looking at the neatness of the stalls and general presentation of the animals.
4. Judging will be entirely at the judge's discretion and he or she may visit each exhibit more than once.
5. The prize winners will be announced by 2.00pm.

Beef cattle

All cattle must be registered in the pedigree grading or supplementary register of their respective breed, unless otherwise specified.

Beef Championship

Judge: Mr Colin Hutchings, Somerset.

£100 to the Champion and £50 to the Reserve Champion.

*The **Frank Durman Perpetual Challenge Cup** (46) will be awarded to the Champion in the beef classes.*

*The **Charlwood Perpetual Challenge Trophy** (15), awarded by Mr T E Keen, for the Reserve Champion in the beef classes.*

Champion pair

£100 to the Champion and £50 to the Reserve Champion

*The **Burstow Perpetual Challenge Trophy (11)**, awarded by C Burstow and Son Ltd, for the Champion pair of Beef animals in the Show, owned by the Exhibitor and shown in the Beef classes.*

Judges pick group of three Championship

£50 to each animal in the Champion group.

Each beef breed judge shall select his/her best three animals to be shown as a group of three. The group of three can be animals from any number of competitors. This will be judged in their stalls, and the winning group of three shall be awarded their prizes during the Grand Parade. Rosettes and prize cards for each animal in the best group.

Public's choice Champion

£100 to the Champion and £50 to the Reserve Champion.

Members of the public shall vote while the marquees are open after judging, and the winning animal shall join the Grand Parade. Rosettes and prize cards awarded.

The South of England Hereford Breeders' Association will award a sash and a rosette to the Champion and certificates to the herdsman showing the Champion male and Champion female.

Champion rosettes will be awarded to the Champion male and the Champion female.

The Sarabande Perpetual Challenge Cup (63), awarded by Mrs P M Noel, for the Champion female.

76. Senior cow or heifer, born in or before 2014.

77. Senior heifer, born in 2015.

78. Junior heifer, born on or after 1st January 2016.

79. Senior bull, over 2 years on the day of the Show.

80. Intermediate bull, between 15 months and two years on the day of the Show.

81. Junior bull, under 15 months on the day of the Show.

82. Group of three animals, must also be entered in the above classes, and the property of the same exhibitor.

Sussex

The Trottenden Challenge Trophy (27) for the Champion Sussex.

83. Cow in milk or in calf, born on or before 30th June 2014.

- 84. Senior heifer**, born on or between 1st July 2014 and 30th June 2015.
- 85. Intermediate heifer**, born on or between 1st July 2015 and 31st December 2015.
- 86. Junior heifer**, born in 2016.
- 87. Senior bull**, born before 1st January 2016.
- 88. Junior bull**, born in 2016.
- 89. Group of three animals**, of which two must be female, entered in the above classes, and the property of the same exhibitor.

Highland

Judge: Mr Robert Phillip, North Yorkshire.

£100 to the Champion and £50 to the Reserve Champion.

Showing Appendix 'A'; and Appendix 'B' cattle.

Highland females entered in the appendix register of the Highland Cattle herd book, either Appendix A or Appendix B, are eligible for entry and are identified by the letter 'A' or 'B' tattooed in the ear or written in waterproof ink on an ear tag.

The Highland Cattle Society will award a rosette to the Champion. Winning exhibitors can gain points for the Highland Cattle Society annual Show Fold of The Year competition.

The Midlands and Southern Highland Cattle Club will present a sash to the Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champion.

*The **Owen Perpetual Challenge Cup** (72) presented by Owen Builders Civil Engineering Ltd, to the Champion Highland.*

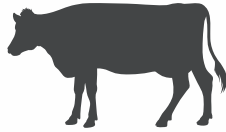
